Saturday August 1, 1942



Russia: Moscow

Berta Lesheminant-Blanch (aged 61, French citizen, French teacher, sentenced to 5 years' internal exile to Kazakhstan on anti-Soviet charges, released early due to medical reasons, returned to Moscow)

Germany: Dachau concentration camp

Fr Gerhard Hirschfelder (arrested in 1941 for criticizing the Nazis for turning the youth away from Christ; **UPDATE**: died from starvation and illness)

Sunday August 2, 1942



Netherlands

Hundreds of Christians of Jewish descent continued to be arrested in retribution for a church statement condemning Nazi racism, including five siblings of the Loeb family

Netherlands: Koningsoord Abbey, Berkel-Enschot village, Tilburg, North Brabant province

Mother Hedwigis OSCO aka Lina Loeb (arrested)

Mother Maria Theresia OSCO aka Door Loeb (arrested)

Mother Veronika OSCO aka Wies Loeb (not arrested because she was bedridden with tuberculosis, later arrested and held for eight or ten days but released for health reasons, died in the convent in August 1944)

Fr Jean Bernard (aged 33, Luxembourgian citizen, arrested by the Gestapo on January 6, 1941, sent to Dachau; released for nine days in February 1942, returned to Dachau; **UPDATE:** released)

Two missionaries killed along with 90 others when a Japanese aircraft bombed the coastal ship Mumutu

Sr Edith Stein (aged 50, convert, sister of Rosa Stein; arrested on July 26, 1942 in Echt,
Netherlands in retribution for a church statement condemning Nazi racism; **UPDATE**:
gassed)

Br Linus OSCO aka Robert Loeb (arrested on August 2, 1942 in Berkel-Enschot village, Tilburg, North Brabant province, Netherlands; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Sr Luise Lowenfels (aged 27, arrested on August 2, 1942 in Lutterade, Netherlands in retribution for a church statement condemning Nazi racism; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Mother Hedwigis OSCO aka Lina Loeb (arrested on August 2, 1942 in Berkel-Enschot village, Tilburg, North Brabant province, Netherlands; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Mother Maria Theresia OSCO aka Door Loeb (arrested on August 2, 1942 in Berkel-Enschot village, Tilburg, North Brabant province, Netherlands; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Rosa Stein (convert, sister of Edith Stein; arrested on July 26, 1942 in Echt, Netherlands in retribution for a church statement condemning Nazi racism; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Fr Jan Kapusta SDB (aged 48, arrested in Dzyatlava, Poland [now Belarus] in 1940, sent to a prison camp; amnestied as a Polish citizen in February 1942; **UPDATE**: arrested as the Polish Armed Forces of the East was exiting the USSR into Iran)

Austria: Hartheim euthanasia center, Alkoven, Eferding

Fr Bernhard Heinzmann (aged 38, arrested January 6, 1941 after publicly condemning "Hitler's idolatry" and "racial delusions"; transferred to Dachau Concentration Camp in November 1941; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Fr Steven Abt (aged 43, Polish citizen, arrested August 1941, sent to Posen concentration camp, released September 1941; arrested October 6, 1941, sent to Posen; transferred to Dachau on October 30, 1941; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Prof Pranas Dovydaitis (aged 55, Lithuanian national, arrested by the Soviets in Kaunas, Lithuania on June 14, 1941; **UPDATE**: indicted on anti-Soviet activity, which he denied)

Helmuth Gunther Guddat Hubener (aged 17, arrested for anti-Nazi activities on February 5, 1942; excommunicated from his church on February 15, 1942; **UPDATE**: convicted of treason, sentenced to death)

Karl-Heinz Schnibbe (aged 17, convicted of treason, sentenced to 5 years' imprisonment)

Rudolf 'Rudi' Wobbe (aged 16, convicted of treason, sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment)

Austria: Hartheim euthanasia center, Alkoven, Eferding

Fr Otto Schuster (aged 44, gassed)

Fr Nicolas Wampach SCJ (aged 32, arrested by the Gestapo in Paris, France on March 7, 1941 for aiding refugees, sent to Buchenwald concentration camp; transferred to Dachau concentration camp on September 21, 1941; **UPDATE**: gassed)

Germany: Dachau Concentration Camp

Fr Josef Bechtel (aged 64, arrested in Niedermendig in February 1941 for supporting a priest who refused to support cohabitation outside marriage; **UPDATE**: died)

Germany: Dachau concentration camp

Pastor Paul Richter (aged 48, husband of Johanna, suspended from his parish in Wilsdruff for six months in March 1934 for his anti-Nazi views, salary reduced by half; fined 200 Reichmarks in March 1939; arrested in Sachsdorf on November 10, 1941; transferred to Dachau in March 1942; UPDATE: died of cardiac arrest)

Friday August 14, 1942



Germany: Dachau concentration camp

Fr Boleslaw Prabucki (aged 38, Polish citizen, brother of Fr Alojzy Prabucki and Fr Pawel Prabucki, arrested by the Germans in Mokre, Poland in the autumn of 1939, sent to Sachsenhausen; transferred to Dachau on December 14, 1940; **UPDATE**: transferred to Hartheim Euthanasia Center)

Fr Pawel Prabucki (aged 49, Polish citizen, brother of Fr Alojzy Prabucki and Fr Boleslaw Prabucki, arrested by the Germans in Gostkowo, Poland in the autumn of 1939, sent to Sachsenhausen; transferred to Dachau on December 14, 1940; **UPDATE**: blessed his brother Boleslaw before Boleslaw's transfer to Hartheim Euthanasia Center, said that they both would soon join their parents and brother Alojzy in heaven)

Archimandrite Fabian Abrantowicz, MIC (aged 57, detained by Soviet border guards on October 22, 1939; tortured in Lviv prison, indicted for espionage on November 13, 1939; UPDATE: charged with "fighting against the revolutionary movement and making an illegal border crossing")

Germany: Brandeburg

Fr Franz Reinisch SAC (arrested on April 15, 1942 when he refused to swear allegiance to Adolph Hitler; **UPDATE**: sentenced to death)

Germany: Dachau Concentration Camp

Fr Joseph Georg Simon Hafner OCDS (aged 41, banned in 1938 from teaching religious education in Oberschwarzach due to his anti-Nazi views; arrested in August 1941 for asking a Nazi on his deathbed to acknowledge that his second civil marriage was invalid; sent to Dachau on December 12, 1941; **UPDATE**: died from abuse and malnutrition)

Germany: Brandeburg

Fr Franz Reinisch SAC (arrested on April 15, 1942 when he refused to swear allegiance to Adolph Hitler; sentenced to death on August 20, 1942; **UPDATE**: beheaded)

Sunday August 23, 1942



Russia: Kotlas, Arkhangelsk oblast

Fr Ryszard Grabski OFM Cap (aged 32, captured by German border guards in occupied Poland while illegally crossing from Soviet held territory in 1940, handed over to Soviet border guards; sent to Kotlas, Arkhangelsk oblast, Russia in May 1941; **UPDATE**: arrested)

Wednesday August 26, 1942



Russia: Moscow

Fr Walter Ciszek SJ (aged 38. U.S. citizen, arrested in Chusovoy, Perm Krai on June 23, 1941, with two other Jesuits had taken advantage of the 1939 Soviet occupation of eastern Poland to volunteer as workers for transfer to Siberia for underground missionary work, charged with anti-Soviet activities and espionage, transferred to Lubyanka Prison in Moscow, beaten and tortured, forced to sign confessions; **UPDATE**: indicted)

Austria: Hartheim euthanasia center, Alkhoven, Eferding

Werner Sylten (aged 49, theologian, first wife had committed suicide in 1935 due to the growing pressure against those of partial Jewish ancestry, gassed)

Saturday August 29, 1942



Russia: Ust-Sysolsk, Komi ASSR

Joseph Eberle Jr (aged 25, son of Joseph Eberle, sent with his mother into internal exile after the 1930 arrest of his father in Krasny Kut, Saratov oblast, worked as a metalworker; arrested on December 24, 1941; **UPDATE**: sentenced to death, later shot dead, exact date unknown)

Fr Dominik Jedrzejewski (aged 66, Polish citizen, arrested on August 26, 1940; sent to Dachau on December 14, 1940; **UPDATE**: died from debilitating work after refusing to renounce the priesthood)

Sunday August 30, 1942



Germany: Dachau concentration camp

Fr Pawel Prabucki (aged 49, Polish citizen, brother of Fr Alojzy Prabucki and Fr Boleslaw Prabucki, arrested by the Germans in Gostkowo, Poland in the autumn of 1939, sent to Sachsenhausen; transferred to Dachau on December 14, 1940; blessed his brother Boleslaw before Boleslaw's August 14, 1942 transfer to Hartheim Euthanasia Center, said that they both would soon join their parents and brother Alojzy in heaven; **UPDATE**: died)

France: Lyons

Cardinal Pierre Marie Gerlier (aged 62, pressured to return 106 Jewish children to the authorities, refused)

France: Toulouse

Archbishop Jules-Geraud Saliege (aged 72, had a pastoral letter read in every parish in his diocese which condemned the deportation of the Jews "The Jews are real men and women. Not everything is permitted against these men and women, against these fathers and mothers. They are part of the human species. They are our brothers like so many others. A Christian should not forget this")

Poland – now Ukraine: Lviv

Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky OSBM (aged 76, brother of Archimandrite Klymentiy Sheptytsky, arrested by invading Russian troops in Lviv in September 1914, sent to Russia; freed in March 1918, returned to Lviv; sent a letter to Heinrich Himmler in February 1942 condemning the murder of Jews, threatened with death in response, began the organized sheltering of hundreds of Jews including 15 in his own residence; UPDATE: in late August 1942 sent a report to Pope Pius XII stating that the German regime was "almost diabolical")
